Membership Update

We believe that it is very important to keep the members of our lodge informed and up to date on changes made by the National Committee this being said; As you may or may not know there has been a membership change for the Order of the Arrow, this decision was made by the National Committee. Below is the updated membership requirements take directly from the National Website

"Beginning February 1, 2019, unit elections will be permitted in Scouts BSA, Venturing and Sea Scout units. The new Order of the Arrow membership requirements are as follows:

- Be a registered member of the Boy Scouts of America.
- Have experienced 15 nights of camping while registered with a troop, crew, or ship within the two years immediately prior to the election. The 15 nights must include one, but no more than one, long-term camp consisting of at least five consecutive nights of overnight camping, approved and under the auspices and standards of the Boy Scouts of America. Only five nights of the long-term camp may be credited toward the 15-night camping requirement; the balance of the camping (10 nights) must be overnight, weekend, or other short-term camps of, at most, three nights each. Ship nights may be counted as camping for Sea Scouts.
- At the time of their election, youth must be under the age of 21, hold the Scouts BSA First Class rank, the Venturing Discovery Award, or the Sea Scout Ordinary rank or higher, and following

approval by the Scoutmaster, Crew Advisor or Sea Scout Skipper, be elected by the youth members of their unit.

 Adults (age 21 or older) who meet the camping requirements may be selected following nomination to and approval by the lodge adult selection committee.

Our commitment to our unchanging mission and purpose remains steadfast, and we are excited to welcome others who share that commitment by extending membership in Scouting's National Honor Society to participants of all older youth programs. We look forward to having female members in 2019 and know that, like all of our OA members, they will serve as role models and inspirations to others – both within the Boy Scouts of America and beyond.

Chapter Service

Around this season each year, Ani Wa Ya Chapter hosts two special service projects. During Thanksgiving, the Chapter helps those in need by collecting turkeys in a famous service project known as the Gobbler Grab. Featured in the OA's National Bulletin, this project has collected more than 12,000 turkeys over the years. The tradition started in 1997 and at the 2018 22nd Annual Gobbler Grab, 553 turkeys were donated by the local Golden Strip community. Altogether, more monetary donations were collected than ever before with 500 turkeys collected. Now, the lifetime total for the project is 12,804 turkeys - this means over 100,000 people have been provided a meal!

Recently on December 13th, the Chapter held its annual Christmas party with over 30 Arrowmen in attendance. A table full of food and treats made for a great night of fellowship as the youth played games and adults conversed. Each year, Ani Wa Ya collects toys for children who do not have the guarantee to have toys under the tree each Christmas. This year, around 50 toys were collected and provided to the Mauldin Children's Home. At the end of the night while hand-in-hand about to sing the OA Song, the Chapter reflected on a successful year, and the current Chapter Adviser, Matthew Watson, announced he would be stepping down with his acceptance to dental school at the Medical University of South Carolina in Charleston. Jay Best was announced as his successor and with the youth leadership at the helm, great things are expected as the Wolf Clan continues to grow!

The costs for all AKK sponsored events is \$116. By registering for the All Access Pass saves you money and eliminates the need to register for each activity or even worse, forgetting to register before the registration period has ended. For 2019, all registrations will be done on line via the Black Pug system currently used by all activities sponsored by Blue Ridge Council.
